#### A Return to the Writers' Den

The Writers' Den at Malden High School has provided students with an inviting space for collaborative and creative writing since its implementation more than seven years ago. In this student-led program, students can share their passion for writing with peers along with furthering their skills to become better writers.

With one of last year's advisors, Isaac Wilde, graduating from Tufts University, the position opened up to a new leader, and Jonathan Ramirez has stepped up to the plate. The program was originally founded in 2016 by current co-advisor Yahaira Marquez and previous advisor Sean Walsh. Walsh taught at Malden High School as an English teacher and was Head of Theater for 13 years, but is no longer working at Malden High.

"The Writers' Den is a space at the school that is dedicated to providing an area that fosters students' creativity and their writing skills, whether it's creative writing or academic writing," Marquez explained years prior for a previous article of The Blue and Gold detailing the Writers' Den. Ramirez agreed with this sentiment, commenting, "I want to learn from the students; I want their voices to be heard and seen in this room."

To do this, Ramirez already has plans for the space: "I'm offering an Open Mic Poetry on December 13th and January 10th for the Joy Block sessions." He further detailed that his plans include "bringing in different forms of writing to students to experiment with," which Ramirez noted is the aspect he is most excited about.

Ramirez, a Tufts student like incumbent Wilde, heard about the program via his major advisor at Tufts, who helped him decide that this job would be "the perfect place to be in." Ramirez detailed that he is "interested in working with high school students and in teaching English and writing. As the Writers' Den intern, I get to do both, while also continuing my own studies."


Both for his internship and personal experience, Ramirez furthered that he is "looking forward to learning what it's like to work at a school, as well as learning what it takes to build a community of writers who feel passionate about their work."

"In the past, I have worked with high school seniors, teaching them about college and the obstacles/opportunities that come with that," Ramirez addressed. "I worked primarily with students



#### **What is the Fair Share Amendment?**

Passed in the Massachusetts Senate in November, Massachusetts Senator Jason Lewis thinks that the Fair Share Amendment is a home run for the state of Massachusetts.

What is the Fair Share Amendment?

Created by Lewis, who represents the people of the Fifth

Middlesex District of Massachusetts—which includes the cities and towns of Malden, Melrose, Reading, Stoneham, Wakefield and parts of Winchester—this amendment would not only tax those who make a million dollars or more a year, but also allow Massachusetts residents 25 or older to be able to attend community college for free. The Amend-

ment has already provided 62 million dollars in financial aid to 25,000 students.

The amendment also rids students and families from paying for school breakfast and lunch by making it no longer income-based. It is simply free for all.



Additionally, the Fair Share Amendment is trying to cover public transportation but needs more money. According to NBC Boston, analysis shows that 25 billion dollars is needed to repair the MBTA system.

Senator Lewis, who was born in South Africa in the early 70s, has grown a strong foundation for social equality and justice. With that, he's also expressed the need for housing within Massachusetts to help combat the rising housing crisis, stating, "We are short at least 200,000 housing units." However, Senator Lewis has a goal to build more affordable housing to accommodate those with financial need.

To address the Massachusetts housing crisis, lawmakers are attempting to pass bills and amendments to better the state, which can be accomplished by citizens who exercise their political voice.



#### MALDEN PUBLIC LIBRARY HIDDEN GEM

Malden Public Library (MPL) located across the street from Malden High School and in the center of Malden, but it is less known that it has its own museum. The MPL museum features a variety of artistic items that showcase Malden's historical past and demonstrate how the Malden Public Library operated in the 1800s. It even displays historical artifacts from the Converse family, who started the globally recognized "Converse" shoe company here in Malden.

Ryan Reed, a local history librarian at the Malden Public Library, shared some information regarding the library's history. "It was built in the 1880s, and it was built as a memorial to Frank Converse. So, his father, Mr. Converse, was sort of the first Mayor of Malden, and he owned a shoe factory here, a very rich man. And Malden didn't have a library at the time, so he had this built."

The tale of the creation of this museum is not all pleasant, however.

Reed commented that "It was in memorial of his son, who was shot in the first fatal bank robbery in the United States, which happened right down here in Pleasant Street. We actually have the clock that was standing right behind him when he was killed. So it's sort of the only witness to the crime. So it's sort of that history. And then, you know, the newer part of the library was built in the nineties. So up until then, from the 1800s until about 1995," Reed explained.


The Malden Public Library still contains some features that were present back when the library first opened. "It's very ornate. If you look really closely, you can see all the different types of carvings and things like that. These [light bulbs] used to all be gas, and when they redid them they did them as exact replicas," Reed explained.

The artwork that is presented in the Malden Public Library consists of old factories of Converse when it was in the works and it shows how simple things were back then and how they have changed from a small shoe factory to a universal industry of shoes that millions across the world own and wear daily.

The Local History hours at the MPL are available for everyone and you can check to see the times on the Malden Public Library website, https://maldenpubliclibrary.org/. For those who have known about this museum or if this is their first time finding out, it's highly recommended to check it out! Visitors might learn a thing or two about Malden's history!

#### Martin Berryman's Return to Malden High School like "Hitting the Lottery"





ment, however, treasurer Oscar Luc hinted at the fact that they are looking "forward to many many more events, especially during the Christmas time!"



Driving up Route 1 Northbound on Friday night, one might have seen two lines out the doors at Dave's Hot Chicken. The fast-casual restaurant chain celebrated its grand opening in Saugus with a bang, inviting New England Patriots players Marcus Jones and Ja'Whaun Bentley in for a meet-and-greet.

Rick Soltes, the restaurant's director of training, was extremely excited about the turnout. "We had so many people coming out here [for an autograph]. If they want one, I just need a review or a slider," he chuckled.

In 2017, the first Dave's Hot Chicken opened in Los Angeles, CA. Since then, the chain has opened up over 100 locations in four different countries across the globe. An industry research firm "Technomic" named it 'America's Fastest Growing Restaurant Chain."

"Just based on this grand opening, you can see how much this means to people," Bentley explained. "I'm just glad I had the opportunity to chip my face in and play a part in all of this." The 27-year-old has emerged as one of the top linebackers for the solid Patriot defense over the past few years.

The menu is straightforward, offering just four different meals consisting of only tenders and sliders. There is a two-slider, two-

The reaper spice is made with one of the hottest chili peppers in the world, the Carolina Reaper,

and even requires a waiver to order.

So, fans of chicken and the Patriots flocked to the restaurant to get a taste of the excellent food and meet two football players while they were at it. There were two lines flowing into the parking lot, one for the food and one for the meet and greet. While customers waited to get an autograph or a picture with Jones and Bentley, restaurant staff came out and took their order, even offering a free milkshake to buyers who reviewed them highly.

"I am just happy that Dave's Hot Chicken is coming out here. It's just good food and a great community," Jones expressed. "I am glad to be here and be a part of this opening." The young cornerback was named first-team all-pro with New England last season as a punt returner but will be on the sidelines for the remainder of this year with a torn labrum.

Foley, a person who attended, explained.

When the presentation began, Knight showed a picture of angry white people trying to stab a Black person with an American flag and explained what it meant to him. He talked about how he saw it often and how it represents how Black people are treated in America.

Keith is a comic artist who shares the experiences he goes through so that other people can relate. His goal is to educate people about ways Black people are treated by society in a way that will also entertain people, which is why he adds a lot of comedy to his work.

He also aims to create graphic novels where the main characters "look like him," as he never saw books like that when he was in school. "I was never assigned books where the protagonists look like me. I got more books where animals were the heroes and not people of color," Knight explained.

Knight talked about how he would always draw with a Black teacher and that meant a lot to him—the fact that he had someone who looked like him and also shared the same interests as him. That teacher impacted him a lot and those experiences that he had with him are something that he still carries with him today.

He then continued to share comic strips that expressed the frustration of being told so many things about how a Black person should act his entire life.

His next topic was how many people tend to avoid the conversation of racism. He then continued to talk about microaggressions. An example he gave is when white people say, "I don't care if they're green or purple people," but there are no green or purple people. He expressed how it "drives [him] crazy" when people say they do not see color, but people should be happy about looking around and getting to see so much diversity and so many different cultures.

"The greatest thing about comics is that they take complex things and they simplify them," Knight continued. Something a lot of people do not realize is that comics have been around for a very long time, and that is what Knight was telling his audience. He explained how hieroglyphics are comics because they use symbols, meanings, and pictures, and they tell a story.

"I hope to share my passion for creating comics with people and just to show that everybody here can do it too. They may not want to do it for a career but I think it's a great way to write notes down, as far as just writing words down, create notes. I do graphic reporting for businesses, where I'll sit in meetings and draw notes, it helps people retain what they're talking about better," Knight explained.

He then shifted the topic to the military and how Black people were mistreated there at different times in history. They were sent overseas maldenblueandgold.com

to save people and give them the rights that they did not even experience themselves.

The graphic novels March, They Called Us Enemy, I Saw It, and Maus, are all books that highlight people's stories and what they went through.

In the graphic novel Maus, the author illustrated the mice as the Jews and the cats as the Nazis, which Knight found interesting. Something he enjoys about comics is how people never question things while reading, even if they are extremely unrealistic. Even though it might not look real at all, people still get drawn to comics.

When the presentation neared the end, he shared his TV show "Woke" on Hulu. While he made sure to emphasize that it was "not for kids," he went through pictures of him while he was on set and described them as his favorite moments on the show. "I was always encouraged by friends and family," Knight said. The audience could tell that he is passionate about what he does through his energy while speaking about his show.

Finally, he mentioned before the presentation came to a close astory behind his "black mugshot" trend. He started this trend when he posted a picture of him holding a black mug and hashtagged it "black mugshot". Soon enough, it quickly spread, and many people started posting pictures of themselves holding a black mug.

"That's what I want to show up when 'black mugshot' is searched," Knight explained. One might probably wonder, why?

Well, mugshots are illegal to post in a lot of countries; but in the United States, they post them "like crazy" Knight emphasized. If you try to get a job, apartment, or even date someone, that mugshot

could ruin all of your chances. This is something that especially affects Black people. Police would post people's mugshots to prove to people that they are doing their jobs without thinking much of it, but it

actually destroys people's lives. That is why he decided to start the "black mugshot" trend.

"Let's learn the true stories instead of learning fairytales," Knight stated.

The MTEC is also planning on going on a snowshoeing trip to New Hampshire during Winter Break and staying at a lodge for days. In fact, this is a trip they happen to take annually. "This is pretty much just a free, safe space for kids to come in and relax and they can take part in any of those activities and programs.

A lot of kids feel like this is home," Lapia detailed.

Not only does MTEC consist of programs and activities, it also includes a variety of college opportunities, with partnerships at Malden Catholic. Lapia explained, "we are looking into financial programs, like how to balance finance when you are an adult and different life skills," as well as the opportunity for warm meals every day. "Not everyone gets the chance to eat at home, so we try our best to have a warm meal at least once every day," Lapia said.

Generally, there is not a schedule students have access to, but the MTEC tries their best to provide calendars every month so that teenagers can see the activities and food options ahead of time. Ortiz noted how they are working on having separate calendars every month and some weekly schedules so that the kids can see what they are participating in every day.

The MTEC has switched to multiple different buildings over the years, but now they are located at 7 Washington Street. "Even though I'm not influential, nor am I the richest person in the world, I want to do what I can, and 'Alhamdulillah' ['praise be to God'), this is something I can do so I try my best to show up when I can show up," said Fatima Benmimoun.

Attendees agreed they wanted to use the event as a way to advocate for Palestinians from afar.. "For me, I wanted to be involved because the kids that I taught reached out to me and I was like, 'you know what? I have to do my part. I have to be involved and that's why I'm here today," said Jabir Ducasse.

Throughout the event, runners and supporters from ages differentiating between five to 50 were waving Palestinian flags, speaking up for Palestine, and helping each other out while facing the messy weather conditions. The runners ran through the bike path and around Malden, a loop that is 3.1 miles. The volunteers received snacks and water, free for everyone throughout the day, as well as pizza.

Ducasse also believes that Palestinians need more action from people around the world to support and bring awareness to them. "I think worldwide, people should

definitely recognize the conflict in the West Bank, and they should do a little more because I feel like there's a lot of silence throughout social media," Ducasse said.

As people express their feelings and ideology on the matter, Susan Hassan, a Palestinian, thought to share a few words about what she feels about Palestine's current situation. "It's just heartbreaking what's been happening in Gaza over the past few weeks, and I think it's important to just support as much as possible, call for ceasefire, and be the voice for the voiceless and that's truly why I came because I really sympathize with this cause and my brothers and sisters that could have easily been me," she said.

"While everyone has been focusing on Gaza, the IDF (Israeli Defense Forces) soldiers have gone into the West Bank, have kidnapped people, have killed people, and there's illegal settlements there and that's been going on for years and years," said Hassan.

She also added, "There's only one true side to this conflict, that it's an occupation and not a conflict between two equal sides. And that there are people who are being targeted, that there's a genocide occurring, and that those people need support and need a voice to stop the apartheid that's happening right now, and has been happening in the

past 75+ years."

As the event continued, a few people wanted to share their thoughts on the event as well. Nour Chouiki, a former MHS student, stated, "I really liked it, it brought awareness... There are innocent people dying, including kids, and I want to do something to help." Chouiki expressed that she "decided to support Palestine" after she learned about what's happening in the West Bank. "I think that people should pay attention more to the conflict," she said. But as she solely expressed, her purpose for joining

the event was "to support humanity."

To add a few more words about the people's thoughts, Hassan said, "You can't say that Hamas are terrorists without saying the IDF isn't a terrorist organization... and there's illegal settlements [in the West Bank] and that's been going on for years."

"We see that people are dying, and a high percentage of those dying people are kids... How can you justify killing kids and think that's ok? There should be an uproar," Ducasse expressed.

it as "a big family where you always feel safe as they always have your back regardless."





# 136TH ANNUAL THANKSGIVING FOOTBALL GAME

Amongst the busy preparations of stuffing the turkey and mashing potatoes, Malden High was preparing for their 136th Thanksgiving Day matchup against the Medford Mustangs at Hormel Stadium.

Since their game during the spring of 2021 in the pandemic-shortened season where the Golden Tornados lost 24-21 on a missed, last-second field goal, Malden had won two in a row— including a convincing score of 34-15 at Fenway Park last year. Going into the game, Malden was riding a seven-game win streak against the Mustangs dating back to 2015 for Thanksgiving day games.

For the first time since 2019, the game returned to Medford due to schedule changes from the pandemic and the aforementioned game at Fenway Park, so fans from both teams made sure to pack into the stands even 20 minutes before kickoff.

After the initial kickoff by Malden sailed out of bounds, the rekick was bobbled by the Medford returner and recovered on their 13 yard line. This looked to be another dominating start for the Golden Tornados, but those feelings were soon unraveled by the Mustangs with their powerful run game which opened the opportunity for deep passes. The opening drive that lasted nearly eight minutes was capped off by a rushing touchdown by Luiz Barbosa. An unsuccessful two-point conversion would keep the score at 6-0 for Medford.

With little time remaining in the first quarter, Malden finally got their opportunity on offense, which was stifled by Medford's strong front seven. With no luck upfront, the Golden Tornados fumbled and lost the ball just outside of the Mustang's territory which would

soon become a common trend in the game.

Fueled by his strong desire to get Malden back into the game, senior captain Karl Lange sped his way off of his blocker and stripped the ball right out of quarterback Jack Lombardo's hands, but the ball was recovered by the offense. Still, the

In need to kickstart their offense, junior quarterback Aidan Brett dialed up a 47-yard strike to wide receiver Nathan Sullivan, which got the offense running. After marching all the way down to Medford's goal line, a missed pass on fourth down crushed all hope for Malden to get their first touchdown of the game.

The first half ended unceremoniously with an unnecessary roughness and a personal foul both being called on Malden during the next drive; even after Malden got the ball back with seconds remaining, Brett was picked off with a short return by Medford.

Although the offense had not possessed much luck, the defense had kept the Golden Tornados in the game being only down one possession, so when Malden came out of their locker room, they looked fired up. Back to back running plays of 15+ yards each had Malden in the driver's seat, but the engine to their offense ran out of gas after penalties pushed them back to their side of the field. Yet again, the defense

proved to hold strong by generating another three and out to give the offense excellent field positioning.

Senior Davian Mcguffie and junior
Marcus Pierre
kept exposing
the now weakened Medford
front seven and
kept fighting for every single
yard. One play after extending their
drive on fourth down, Brett found
Sullivan on a beautiful post route
and caught a 33-yard touchdown
over two defenders. As the extra
point sailed through the uprights,
the Malden crowd exploded as they

now led 7-6 over their bitter rival.

Just as quickly Malden
clawed their way back into
the game, they slipped far
off after all momentum
was halted by senior Stevens Exateur as he took an

88 yard kickoff to the house to make the score 12-7 and the Medford fans exploded in excitement. As the end of the play wrapped up, all eyes were on the sidelines as Brett was injured during special teams cover-

age and would not see the field for the rest of the day. This

would mean backup freshman quarterback Ryan Bowdridge had to step up during the most crucial part of the game.

ball and was picked off by one of the defensive lineman. Barbosa slammed the door shut by sneaking into the endzone on a designed quarterback run, leaving the score at 24-7.

Even with the game out of reach, Malden would not quit as Bowdridge hit his tight end Earl Fevrier on an out route and would break through his defender to score a 65 yard touchdown. Junior Robert Fernandes's extra point would make the score 24-14, but even after a fumble that would give Malden the ball back around mid field, Bowdridge's pass was tipped at the line of scrimmage to a Medford defensive back which would be taken all the way back for a touchdown, ending the game with a final score of 30-14.

Head coach Witche Exilhomme spoke on the week leading up to the game and mentioned how, "preparation was good going in, until about the day before the game. We found out that we wouldn't be having at least 10 players, six of them being starters, due to grades. That forced us to reshuffle the deck in practice that we had been preparing for about two weeks.

"I believe with the time we had, we did a great job. Even in the game you can tell. It was 7-6 late in the third quarter," explained Exilhomme.

Reflecting on their season, Exilhomme noted how, "we did not have a good year this year due to various adversities that this team had to face with injuries, players falling off, and losing track of our goals. One thing after another for this year, but with 25 seniors coming back, we're looking forward to the next season, and we're gonna hit the ground running doing what we do."

Ask anyone about what they believed the biggest downfall of the team had been this season and the answer most likely heard would be the injuries: "[The injuries] definitely did hurt the most. Now you have to put other players in there who are not familiar playing those positions. There's a lot of communication that has to be 'downloaded' within that amount of time and the team were planning to adjust to the staff based on information and players that we had in place." Exilhomme continued, expounding, "We couldn't predict what defense or looks that the defense would give us based on how we lined up because there's new players, new personnel in place really messed us up."

With a long offseason now ahead of the team, there is now added motivation to come back with a vengeance to prove that this was just a down year. Losing starters like Lange and Mcguffie who have been staples of the team over the years will hurt, but new faces will step up to the moment and help direct Malden football back to their winning ways.
